We are being written up in Standing on the Side of Love's publicity, and we have sparked other congregations to get similar signs. On August 18th our sign was re-hung. It has been repaired and now reads "Black Lives Still Matter." Our sign is making a difference.

Beginning my third year with LCUUC I cannot tell you enough how pleased and proud I am to have been called to such an incredible place. I am so looking forward to another year of becoming the change we want to see in the world.

EQUAL EXCHANGE COFFEE, TEA, AND CHOCOLATE



I will again be selling Equal Exchange fairly-traded organic coffee, tea, hot chocolate, and baking cocoa **beginning on September 6**. I will also be selling single-serve French Roast coffee, which is new this year and I've had several people ask about it. Chocolate bar sales will resume in October.

LCUUC purchases these items from Equal Exchange in cooperation with the UU Service Committee (UUSC) to help support small farmers and raise funds for the UUSC and LCUUC. I started selling these products in 2007 at a small profit to our church to help pay for the Equal Exchange organic coffees we drink every Sunday after the service. This past fiscal year (2014-15), we profited about \$1212 which was about \$270 more than the previous year. These products make great gifts for birthdays, holidays, or thank yous.

LCUUC again looks forward to your continued support. I'm usually **open by 9:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings** for the early birds and **stay open until noon**. I accept cash or personal checks to LCUUC.

BUILDING & GROUNDS COUNCIL

LCUUC EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

In 2012, the LCUUC Board of Trustees adopted a policy that an emergency preparedness procedure for preparing and responding to the hazards of tornado/high wind, smoke and fire, and carbon monoxide shall be implemented. Here are the highlights of our emergency preparedness procedure:

Tornado/high wind

- * There is a Public Alert Certified Weather Radio with Specific Area Message Encoding in the church office.
- * In the event of a tornado/high wind watch, alert those present and prepare to go to the shelter areas.
- * In the event of a tornado/high wind warning, alert those present and proceed to the shelter areas.
- * Shelter areas: kitchen (close the counter windows), restrooms, room 5 (doors shut), utility rooms and closets. **Stay away from the windows and outside doors!**
- * Wait for all-clear to leave the shelter areas

Fire

- * If the building is on fire, (a) **everyone should leave the building**, (b) call 911 to report the fire, and (c) congregate on the east parking lot in front of the solar panels (be sure to leave room for emergency vehicles to pass).
- * One person should be responsible to ensure that everyone has left the building:
 - During Sunday services, the Worship Representative should have this responsibility
 - For other events, the event organizer should have this responsibility
- * Instructions, including escape routes, will be posted.
- * There are fire/smoke detectors in the front and rear foyers, social hall, and office. If a smoke/fire alarm sounds, NEVER ignore the alarm. Take appropriate action to extinguish the fire if possible, or evacuate the building and call 911.
- * There are red fire extinguishes rated for all kinds of fires located throughout the building.

Carbon Monoxide

- * There are carbon monoxide alarms located in the front and rear foyers, social hall, and office.
- * If a carbon monoxide (CO) alarm sounds NEVER ignore the alarm. Immediately move everybody to fresh air (CO is lighter than air, so keep low), either outdoors or near an open window (sanctuary, nursery, or classroom 2).
- * Call 911 or emergency service technicians: Jeff Rohloff 414-333-4038 for furnace; Grenz Service 262-646-3880 for water heater
- * Do not re-enter the premises or move away from the open door or window until the emergency services responder has arrived, the premises have been aired out, and the CO alarm remains in its normal condition.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY

Electrical power cords often include a 3rd grounding wire to prevent potential electric shock hazard when operating or touching the equipment. This applies to extension cords, as well as to appliances and tools with exposed metal surfaces which may become electrically "live". PLEASE DO NOT MODIFY THESE CORDS BY REMOVING THE GROUND PIN ON THEIR PLUGS – DOING SO ENDANGERS YOURSELF AND ANYONE ELSE WHO MAY COME IN CONTACT WITH THE EQUIPMENT!!!


Starting in October, the Adult Enrichment Committee will be offering a four-session workshop on Creative Aging. The workshop will loosely follow the UUA curriculum based on the book *From Age-ing to Sage-ing: A Profound New Vision of Growing Older*, by Zalman Schachter-Shalomi and Ronald S. Miller. LCUUC member Kathie Gorski will moderate the sessions, following notes from a class she took at a UU church in Florida two winters ago. There is no need to read the book to participate. Goals include:

- ◆ To awaken to a vision of spiritual eldering
- ◆ To deepen understanding of aging and elderhood
- ◆ To engage in the “homework” of spiritual eldering – journaling/writing, meditation, sharing and learning with each other
- ◆ To witness a transformation from older to elder

The sessions will be held on **four consecutive Sundays, Oct 18 and 25 and Nov 1 and 8, from 11:45 am to 1:30 pm**, and will include a simple potluck at the start.

Invitation To Participate in the UUA Common Read for 2015-16

The LCUUC book club, Books for Lekooks, is on hiatus and is being replaced for the 2015-16 season by a UUA Common Read. According to the UUA: “A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations.”

Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson is this year's selection. Stevenson, founder of the Equal Justice Initiative, has dedicated his legal career to defending those who are trapped by an often capricious, political, and willfully unjust criminal justice system - poor people, people of color, children, and others over whom the system has run roughshod. It speaks to justice, mercy, and compassion, themes of concern to us as Unitarian Universalists and as human beings.

Logistics:

Anyone interested in participating in the Common Read at LCUUC is invited to a very **quick planning meeting after the service on Sunday September 20th, at 11:30 am in classroom 2**. At that time we will choose the date and time to discuss the book.

In the meantime, if you are interested in reading the book and participating in the discussion, you can get a head start by borrowing or purchasing it now. The Waukesha County library system has eight copies but all are currently out on loan (as of 8-18-15). The book just became available in paperback (on August 18th) and costs \$9.63 from Amazon.

Children's Religious Education

Hello! I am honored to join you this year as Minister of Religious Education, following in the large shoes of Kerry Duma. As an interim, my role will be to transition the program from one leader to the next. Our hope is to begin the search for a new Director of Religious Education soon, either for the next year or the following one.

It is clear to me already that our religious education program benefits from strong foundations, laid both by Kerry and a strong core of lay leaders. Your enthusiasm, commitment to excellence in education, and love of young people is what makes this ministry, and the congregation itself, special. I hope to support this already strong spirit and offer what gifts I have to its growth.

My own background is as an educator. After growing up in Milwaukee, I was trained as a high school social studies teacher, but once I received my license, worked in elementary special education. During that time, I returned to Unitarian Universalism, the faith of my childhood, and soon became the religious educator for a small congregation near Ft. Lauderdale. I soon moved to Chicago, where I took another DRE position, this time serving a program of about 200 children and youth. Eventually, I decided to enroll in divinity school, and last year returned to southeastern Wisconsin afterward three years of study to serve as pastor to the United Unitarian Universalist Congregation, our sibling church in Waukesha.

My dual role, serving you as religious educator and United as minister, means that I will be with you less than previous DREs, about one Sunday a month. While perhaps not ideal, we are fortunate that our amazing and dedicated Religious Education Committee will be filling as Point People. They will greet newcomers, support teachers and students, and be available for questions for all things religious education. I will also be readily accessible via email and phone, and would always be delighted to hear from you.

Included in this newsletter is the list of classes for the year, designed to follow our three-year rotation model. If you have not already done so, please register your children and youth. Paper forms are available at church near the greeter's tables. In addition, we are also pioneering a [new online registration form](#). Just follow the link and you will be all set!

Lake Country Religious Education for Children and Youth

Nursery: Childcare is available every Sunday for infants to ages three or four.

Kindergarten - 2nd Grade: *Spirit Play* is a Montessori-based program that teaches children about UU principles and history through storytelling and play. Children consider the spirit of love and the mystery of life in an environment designed to elicit wonder. Following a story about a core area of our faith, children discover their own answers to a variety of “wondering” questions. A choice of hands-on activities then provides the opportunity for further discovery and expression. A spiritual community is created that supports multiple learning styles.

3rd - 5th Grade: In this program, children learn about their Unitarian Universalist identity with a curriculum called *Spirit of Adventure*, using the themes of sports, medicine, food, science, building, exploring and the web of life as ways to discover the people and values of our Unitarian Universalist faith.

Middle School: This year we will explore the faith practices of a variety of religious groups in the surrounding community, using the curriculum *Neighboring Faiths*. Visits to churches and temples are a favorite highlight of the program. Each unit includes learning some basics about the religion, a field trip (or guest), and time to reflect on the experience. The goal of the curriculum is to promote understanding and respect for other cultures while nurturing Unitarian Universalist identity and values.

High School: Our youth will also explore World Religions this year, with discussion, guest speakers and visits to places of worship. Based on the UU curriculum, *Building Bridges*, we will deepen our understanding of the dynamic, fascinating and varied world in which they live – seeking to broaden their knowledge of humanity and embolden their spiritual search. Our youth will also have our monthly *Socrate’s Café* discussion and will attend worship services.

High School Youth Group: Youth are invited to meet from 11:15 - Noon most Sundays to plan social events, social action projects, fundraisers for specific causes or service trips and help with church activities.

Our Whole Lives (OWL): 10th – 12th Graders: *OWL* is a holistic program that models and teaches caring, compassion, respect, to address the attitudes, values, and feelings that youth have about themselves and the world. This optional comprehensive sexuality education curriculum will be offered in early 2016.

Transitions: We offer two Transitions programs as our children move from childhood to adolescence and on to adulthood, each culminating in them leading a Sunday worship service.

5th and 6th Grade Transitions: A 5-week program that leads children through a process of reflection and discovery as they make the transition from childhood to adolescence.

Senior Transitions: A program invites our graduating seniors to examine their faith and consider what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist and a member of Lake Country.
