## Minister's Muusings



The colors of fall are blazing and the air has chilled. You've gotten out your sweater or your hoodie, maybe lit your first fire in the fireplace.

Autumn rituals. The things we do to mark the changing of the seasons.

Some rituals in our lives are good - they make us feel warm and safe; completing them tells us that all is right with the world (even when things may not actually be perfect). Other rituals are not so wonderful - they are behaviors we can't seem to shake, even when they make us feel miserable.

What are your rituals? What things do you do the same way, over and over again - what things would feel odd or wrong if you did them differently? Do you engage in sacred ritual, or do you find your sacred practices do not need ritual elements?

What are the secular rituals you choose? The meal you make for Thanksgiving? The way you get ready to leave the house each day? The way you say goodbye to friends and family?

Rituals don't have to be elaborate, though they may be. They don't need props or materials, those they may use them.

Cherish the beloved and familiar rituals which support and affirm you and those you love. If you have never shared the "why" or the beginnings of holiday and family rituals, consider sharing it this season. Ritual with meaning holds a greater value and depth than simple acts alone.

Examine the not-so-beloved rituals of your life equally. Does every argument have a sameness, to the point that you could carry on even if the other person went out for a snack in the middle? Does every trip from the house involve four clothing changes? Every business presentation or staff meeting involve the same cycle of procrastination and self-doubt?

Dismantle the rituals which cause you harm. Refuse to participate any more. Break the cycle - begin now. Sit in the discomfort and unease caused by the change. You can probably do it. If you can't, find help and support. It's out here.

Celebrate what heals you. Discard what diminishes you. Make a ritual of wholeness.

## **IMPORTANT- PLEASE READ**

### **2020 VisionQuest Moves Into Its Next Phase!**

After months of work and a lot of input we arrived last week at our vision statement, and finished Phase 1 of our Mission and VisionQuest. We voted as a congregation on two final possibilities, and the second choice emerged as a clear winner. This statement targets where we will be placing our emphasis for the next 5 years:

### **LCUUC's NEW VISION STATEMENT**

**"In 2020 LCUUC is an inclusive spiritual community that is diverse, growing, vibrant, and economically sustainable. We provide enriching lifespan education and a strong public presence supporting social justice."**

NOW PHASE 2 BEGINS!

Now that we know who we want to be in 2020, it is time to examine and update our mission statement.

Our current mission statement, created with the founding of the church, reads:

*Lake Country Unitarian Universalist Church is a religious community that encourages spiritual growth in compassion, wisdom and understanding. We draw inspiration from the principles of Unitarian Universalism, diverse religious sources, and the breadth of human experience. We seek to live in accordance with this inspiration, working for positive change in our community, country and the world.*

A mission statement should be a concise statement of what the congregation wants to be known for, or known as, within the wider world; what the congregation wants to mean to the community. It isn't set in stone, but should be revisited every 5-10 years, to see if it remains relevant and accurate

Now that we have a vision, we ask ourselves:

- ◆ If this is our vision, where does this lead us in mission?
- ◆ What "must" we do?
- ◆ In what ways does our vision lead us in service toward others in the broader community?

The Committee on Ministry is tasked with creating an updated or new mission statement- one which reflects who we are as a spiritual community and our vision of who we will be.

**WE WANT YOUR INPUT IN THIS CREATION PROCESS!**

Here is the timeline and how the process works:

You read this article.

You finish this sentence: "LCUUC needs to exist so that...". BEFORE NOV. 15, write your completed sentence and drop it off on Rev. Amy's desk, or in the envelope on the wall of the social hall, or email it to Rev. Amy at [amypshaw@hotmail.com](mailto:amypshaw@hotmail.com). Your answer should address why this congregation uniquely exists. Please be direct, and as concise and clear as possible. Keep answers under 100 words.

After November 15<sup>th</sup>, the Committee on Ministry and Rev. Amy will take all the answers received and will tweak, tighten, revise, or rewrite the current mission statement to reflect our current congregation, using your answers to guide us.

By January 1, 2016 the revised or recreated mission statement will be presented to the Board for approval. If approved, it will go into use.

Couples in Recovery (CIR) offers a program of recovery for both partners of a couple to attend together, in addition AA, Al-Anon, and other 12-step work. Goals include to heal, rebuild and strengthen the couple relationship. CIR follows AA principles, steps, and traditions, and applies them to a shared program of recovery. Couples who chooses to recover together, add another dimension to their individual recoveries.

We welcome you to Couples in Recovery - in this safe place, you can learn tools from other recovering couples. You will learn communication skills and have a forum to express the points of view of each partner. Here you can identify the effects of the disease on the relationship and recognize patterns of recovery that tell us recovery is progressive, too.

### **KINTSUGI SANGHA** **Thursdays from 6:30-8:15** **p.m. in the Sanctuary**

The Kintsugi Sangha is a place to sit in silent supportive community and share the experience of being genuinely human. It's easy to explain and sometimes not so easy to do: only just sit, gently, quietly, with a calm clear mind and open heart. The Kintsugi Sangha welcomes all traditions but draws primarily from the tradition of the Rinzaï Zen lineage of Buddhism.

We have discussion topics each week about things like good and bad, joy, skillful means, judgment, attach-

ment, fear. We learn about how traditional teachings address these subjects and also discuss how to take this information off the meditation cushion and out into the 21st century world of work deadlines, family obligations and traffic jams.

Drop by some Thursday evening; newcomers or anyone wanting more time is welcome as of 6PM. There is no prerequisite. All are welcome. Chairs and cushions are provided.

## Children's Religious Education

Religious Education continues this month with several new programs and activities! Here is a brief summary of what is happening:

**Kindergarten – 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade:** Our youngest class will dive into new stories that shed light on our Unitarian Universalist principles. They range from stories about the seven blind mice, gratitude and thanksgiving and begin our transition into the holiday season with a story about Jesus. After listening to the story and exploring it together, children have the opportunity to creatively express their experience.

**3 - 5<sup>th</sup> Grade:** Our elementary class will continue its active and engaging curriculum with the exploration of medicine and the upcoming winter holidays. We'll learn about the Universalist Clara Barton, who founded the American Red Cross, how to do first aid in times of trouble, Unitarian author Charles Dickens who wrote *A Christmas Carol*, and how a Unitarian songwriter wrote the famous tune, Jingle Bells.

**6 – 8<sup>th</sup> Grade:** Our middle school class will continue its study of Christianity, including debriefing their visit to St. John Neumann Parish and visiting St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Slinger. We'll look at the reformation and how it paved the way for Unitarian Universalism to emerge.

**9-12<sup>th</sup> Grade:** Our high school class will start and end the month with the popular Socrates Café, where youth choose and explore topics that are interesting to them. The month will include a study of Protestantism and new religious traditions like Mormonism and Baha'ism.

In addition, we will be hosting a Parent's Orientation for our **High School Our Whole Lives (OWL)** program. It is a comprehensive and progressive sexuality and spirituality program created by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ and is designed to offer our youth the tools to make informed, healthy and kind decisions in relationships. Look for emails coming soon with more details!

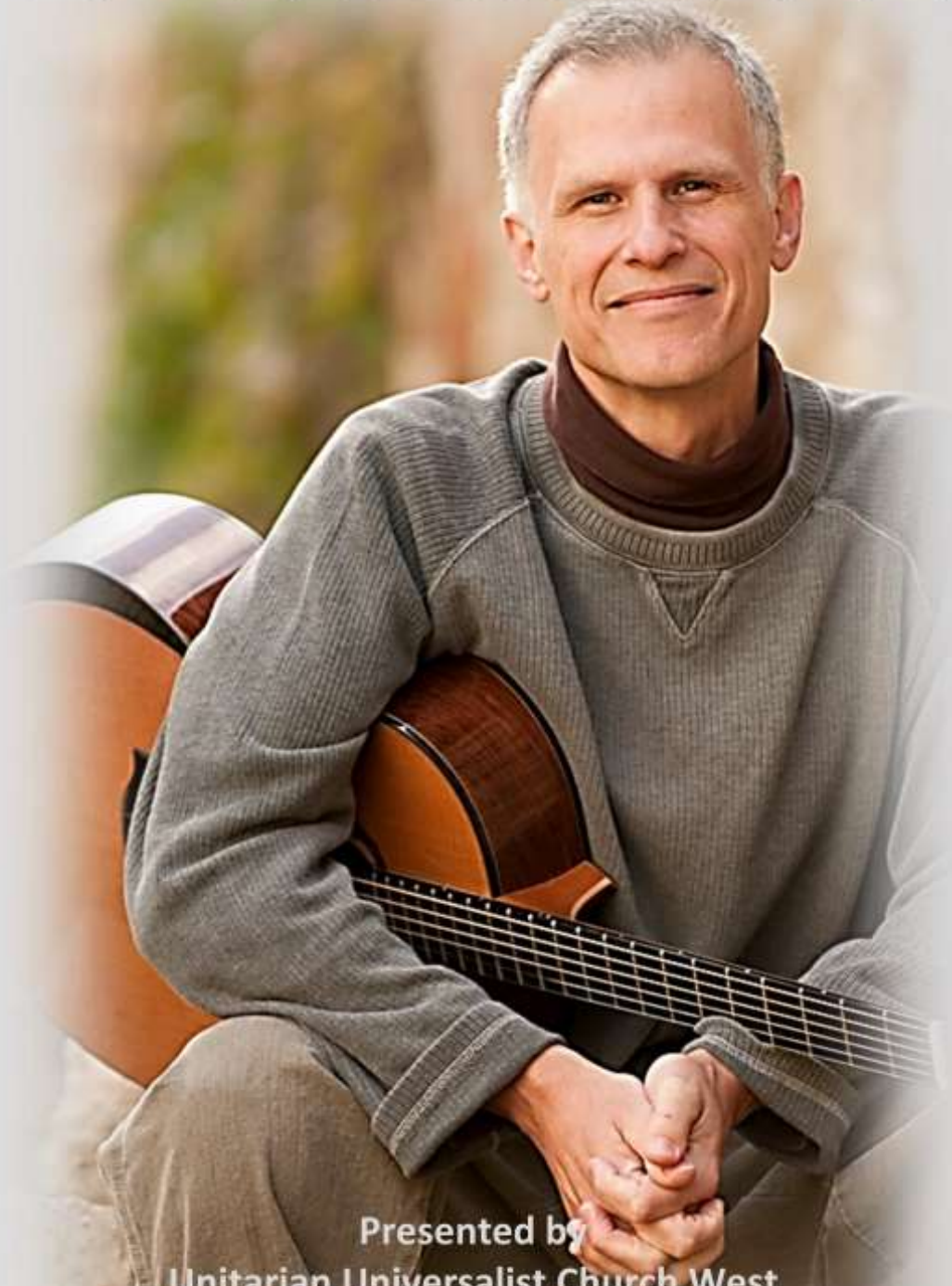
